Caregivers of people with Alzheimer's and related dementias provide care for a longer duration than caregivers of people

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with other types of conditions (79% versus 66%). Well over half (57%) of family caregivers of people with Alzheimer's and related dementias provide care for four years or more.

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Adult day centers. A safe environment for your loved one, adult day centers offer structured activities and programs, such as art or music therapy and a means for your loved one to socialize.
