Twelve Bantu languages are spoken by more than five million people, including Rundi, Rwanda, Shona, Xhosa, and Zulu.

There are 556 documented Bantu languages divided into 7 subgroups of varying sizes. However, most analysis of Bantu noun class semantics thus far has been conducted on a very narrow sample of these languages, primarily focusing on widely-spoken languages like Swahili.

Bantu languages According to Carl Meinhof , the Bantu languages have a total of 22 noun classes called nominal classes (this notion was introduced by W. H. J. Bleek ). While no single language is known to express all of them, most of them have at least 10 noun classes.
